Point in Time Count

Project Homeless Connect will be held on January 28, 2016, 9:00-2:00, at

St. Joseph's Catholic Church. The primary objective of <u>Project Homeless Connect</u> is to provide direct service to the homeless and the secondary objective is to assist with a central location to conduct the Point in Time count. This event provides a Free LUNCH (lasagna), dental services, haircuts, eye care, chiropractic, and message. There will also be a clothing drive. (Clothes need to be delivered to St. Joseph's on the evening before.) Shuttle service is available from Share Fromhold, Friends of the Carpenter and Share House. Medicaid Integration

For the Health Care Authority's complete report click, <u>HCA's Early Adopter Initiative</u>. *Early Adopter Conference is February 22nd at the Hilton.* Homeless service providers are encouraged to attend this conference to be a voice at the table for housing support.

Vanessa gave a little history as to why the transition in the way health care is delivered is being made. As an example, she explained that someone who has an addiction, depression and health issues would need to navigate several systems to get care: Regional Support Network and the County and DSHS and then MCO's. This is complicated, so by 2020 the state intends to integrate these systems. In our region, Clark County has come together with Skamania and chosen to start full integration on April 1st. (This is called Early Adopter.) In our region care will go to two MCOs: Molina and Community _____ Washington, both of which will be required to pay for most mental health services. For crisis, there will be a Behavioral Health Administrative Services Organization. Please provide your name to Tabitha Jensen if you would like to be on the County's Early Adopter Listserv to remain updated on this transition.

Andy added that pilot projects will help us to figure out how to facilitate good communication between a care coordinator and a case manager to make it a smoother process for the clients we serve.

Adverse Childhood Experiences

Cyndie spoke on Understanding Adverse Childhood Experiences and the chemical processes that result and can unfortunately can be passed on through generations. The county is now focusing more on education of ACEs because it is the deeper cause of some physical health and chronic disease issues. There is a series of community protective factors that can be implemented to minimize the traumatic effects of ACEs, mentoring being an essential factor. Your involvement is welcome at the <u>ACES Action Alliance</u> which has four teams.

ACEs Action Alliance focuses on four teams:

- Assessment and Evaluation Team
- Education and Awareness Team
- Trauma-informed Organizations Team
- Cross-Sector Collaboration Team
