	The Affordable Housing Fund Levy was passed in 2016 as a seven year	
	property tax for homeowners in Vancouver city limits. The funding goes towards:

	The replacement levy will be on the special ballot in February 2023. It	
	will grant \$10 million per year over the course of 10 years to continue

	 Eliminating caps on unit development cost 	
	Exemptions for low income homeowners will be requested but is	
	unlikely to be factored in.	
	City Council approved the Ballot language on September 19 th , 2022.	
	Affordable Housing Levy Replacement ballot language :	
	The City of Vancouver Council adopted Resolution No.	
	concerning the replacement of an expiring affordable	
	housing property tax levy. This proposition would replace an expiring	
	property tax levy and fund housing and housing services for people	
	with low and very low incomes, including those with disabilities, veterans, seniors, and families with children, by authorizing a regular	
	property tax levy generating \$10,000,000 annually (approximately	
	\$0.30/\$1,000 assessed value) for ten years, beginning in 2024,	
	pursuant to RCW 84.52.105. All levy proceeds would be used for	
	affordable housing purposes pursuant to an administrative and	
	financial plan adopted by City Council.	

Terrell Berry, A Way Home 10:20am **Anchor Community Initiative** Washington The Anchor Community Initiative (ACI) is a flagship program for A Way Home Washington. ACI provides support for youth and young adults to access services quickly. As of now, there is a gap where youth can do so in a timely manner. The plan is broken down in these next steps: 1. By Name List 2. Reduce to Zero 3. End and Sustain **By Name List** Goal: Achieve a comprehensive, real-time, by name list that is reliable. This is achieved through: By name list score card Reliable data Youth and young adult engagement **Reduce to Zero** Goal: Drive monthly reductions in the number of unhoused youth and young adults. This is achieved through: Systems improvement Monthly reductions Equity **End and Sustain** Goal: Reach functional zero, have equitable outcomes, and sustain This is achieved through: Confirming zero Equitable outcomes Sustainability ACI is built on youth and young adult engagement. Policies and procedures need to meet youth/young adult approval and oversight. Currently in Clark County, a Youth By Name List is in development, more youth focused prevention and diversion funding is being allocated, and "in reach" teams are being organized. 10:30am **Pocket Guide Update** Lois Smith, Pocket Guide The 7th, and current, edition of the Pocket Guide is **blue**. Each edition is in a different color to distinguish differences. The material is made to survive all weather conditions and events – except for fire – and is small enough to be transported in various places. Funding for the Pocket Guide is through private donations that are solely to cover the cost of printing. Due to Covid and rising production costs, supplies are very limited. Those who work directly with unhoused individuals will be the priority for distribution. Many unhoused people already have older editions but the priority is to get Pocket Guides to the newly unhoused or those without an older edition.

There are new updates with each edition 988 has replaced the Suicide Prevention Hotline Friends of the Carpenters provides shower and laundry Coordinated Outreach line has replaced the Street Outreach Pet care is now provided by the Humane Society of Southwest Washington 10:45am **Coordinated Outreach Update** Clara Johnson, Council for the Homeless In July 2022, the Coordinated Outreach teams held their first in person meeting to promote team building. Coordinated Outreach is currently working on a vision statement that is in the drafting stages: Affect policy, community and homelessness. Serve people through empathy and compassion using a trauma informed lens. Collaboration with other providers. Coordination between outreach providers to evaluate, develop and enhance service provision using a personcentered, anti-oppressive, anti-racist, trauma informed lens. Year 1 Accomplishments: 265 unhoused people have been engaged with by an outreach staff member 80 have been successfully housed 74 were housed without ongoing subsidy 37 days was the average span of initial contact and being housed 4 new partnerships Dress for Success in Portland, Oregon provides professional clothing and grooming assistance for unhoused job seekers. • C-Roots, a not for profit tiny home developer that provides affordable tiny homes to unhoused individuals. Compass Career Solutions which provides programs and services through supported employment, supportive housing, person-centered planning, community inclusion, youth readiness, and transitions for individuals with various support Couv Collective, an organization dedicated to addressing trauma from addiction, homelessness, and mental health challenges. Next steps for Coordinated Outreach Provide more training opportunities for outreach staff. Increase community engagement and presence.
